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ABOUT THE UKRAINIAN WORLD CONGRESS

For almost 60 years, the Ukrainian World Congress (UWC) has been the voice of the global Ukrainian community. Today we represent the interests of over 25 million Ukrainians through organized communities in more than 80 countries. Our role today is more important than ever before, advocating for Ukraine's sovereignty, democracy, and human rights, and strengthening Ukrainian identity across generations.

Headquartered in Toronto, with an operations office in Kyiv, UWC works closely with governments, parliaments, international organisations and civil-society partners around the world. Its purpose is clear: to unite the strength of the global diaspora to secure victory for Ukraine, drive its renewal, and build a strong, united Ukrainian world.



MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



The year 2025 was one of courage, unity and measurable progress. In the face of Russia's ongoing aggression, the Ukrainian World Congress stood shoulder to shoulder with the defenders of Ukraine, volunteers and the millions of Ukrainians worldwide who stood up to an imperial regime.

From the Munich Security Conference to the United Nations General Assembly in New York, from Brussels to Canberra, UWC carried Ukraine's message into the halls of power. Across 80 countries, communities mobilised for rallies, forums and cultural initiatives that educated global citizens and advocated for increased military, economic and political support for Ukraine. Our youth and educators launched new programmes; our leaders engaged parliaments, media and allies; our donors transformed solidarity into measurable impact.

Together, we are not only defending Ukraine's freedom; we are shaping its future.

As we look towards 2026 – the Year of Ukrainian Unity – we do so with confidence and resolve. With your continued support, we will expand our reach, empower our youth and ensure that Ukraine's victory leads to renewal, dignity and freedom for generations to come.



ADVANCING VICTORY

November 15-25, 2024. Official visit to Northern Europe. In Denmark, Sweden, Norway, and Finland, UWC President Paul Grod held meetings with government officials, parliamentarians, and defense representatives. Key topics: strengthening support for Ukraine, humanitarian cooperation, and the use of frozen Russian assets. The visit reinforced political ties, expanded partnerships, and amplified Ukraine's voice in the region.

February 2025. Munich Security Conference. UWC President Paul Grod led the delegation to strengthen international support for Ukraine. The delegation took part in the plenary session on European security and engaged with the Ukrainian community in Germany through public advocacy events. The visit deepened UWC's international relations, consolidated partnerships, and strengthened the voice of the Ukrainian diaspora on the global security stage.

March 2025. Official visit to Australia. UWC President Paul Grod held meetings with federal and state leaders in Victoria and New South Wales, including Premier of Victoria Jacinta Allan and Minister for Foreign Affairs Penny Wong. Key topics: military and humanitarian aid, sanctions policy, Australia's participation in the "coalition of the willing," and the use of frozen Russian assets. The visit strengthened political dialogue, expanded international support for Ukraine, and reinforced UWC's presence in the region.

July 10-15, 2025. Ukraine Recovery Conference in Rome. UWC President Paul Grod met with members of the Italian Parliament's Committee on Foreign and European Affairs and took part in the Forum of Ukrainians in Italy. Key topics: the return and reintegration of Ukrainians, countering Russian propaganda, accuracy of educational materials, and protection of Ukrainians' rights in Italy. The visit enhanced UWC's presence in Italy and reaffirmed its role as a coordinator of the global Ukrainian community.

ADVANCING VICTORY

August 13, 2025. Visit to the United Kingdom. UWC President Paul Grod and Petro Rewko, Chair of the Association of Ukrainians in Great Britain, held meetings with UK government officials and met with Ukraine's Ambassador Valerii Zaluzhnyi. Discussions focused on Ukraine's recovery, national identity, and countering disinformation. The meetings strengthened cooperation with British partners and underscored the role of the Ukrainian community in advancing Ukraine's national interests.

August 2025. The UWC delegation, headed by President Paul Grod, met with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy in Kyiv to coordinate efforts around recovery, support for the Armed Forces, the return of abducted children, investment in reconstruction, and the strengthening of diplomatic alignment.

Advocacy focus: Strengthen ties with Ukrainian state authorities, evaluate needs for reconstruction and humanitarian support, and coordinate diaspora support on the ground.

September 2025. 80th United Nations General Assembly. The UWC delegation met with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, Ukrainian officials, and global leaders. Advocacy focus: the return of deported Ukrainian children, restoration of territorial integrity, and justice for victims of aggression. Outcome: reinforced international support for Ukraine, expanded partnerships, and strengthened UWC's role in global advocacy.

ADVANCING VICTORY. OUTCOMES:

Sustained high-level access.

UWC delegations repeatedly secured meetings with ministers, senior diplomats and the President of Ukraine – this sustained access is central to converting diaspora influence into policy support and reconstruction partnerships.



STRATEGIC IMPACT: UNITE WITH UKRAINE KEY HIGHLIGHTS



Fifteen tracked armored vehicles were delivered to the 109th Brigade of the Territorial Defense Forces of Ukraine as part of a \$1.77 million CAD (\$1.29 million USD / ₴53.5 million UAH) support package, strengthening mobility and protection for frontline defenders.

UNITE WITH UKRAINE: KEY HIGHLIGHTS

\$1.68 million CAD (\$1.22 million USD / ₴51 million UAH) in tactical medical supplies and equipment was delivered to the Main Directorate of Intelligence of the Ministry of Defence of Ukraine (HUR), enhancing combat medical readiness and lifesaving capabilities.




A **Sikorsky S-76A air ambulance** was donated to Ukraine by Helijet International, the Ukrainian World Congress, and the Maple Hope Foundation. This is the first private aircraft of its scale donated from Canada to Ukraine, providing critical aerial medical evacuation capabilities.



In partnership with the Serhiy Prytula Charity Foundation, Unite with Ukraine successfully procured and delivered **26 Land Rover Snatch armored vehicles** to support the State Special Transport Service of Ukraine, enhancing safe mobility for personnel in high-risk operational environments.



750 First Person View (FPV) drones, valued at over \$480,000 CAD (\$345,000 USD / ₴14 million UAH), were delivered to ten frontline units of Ukraine's defense and security forces in partnership with Saint Javelin. The drones were funded by the "Birds of Freedom 2.0" campaign, supported by more than 1,600 donors from 22 countries.



Over the past 12 months, we successfully conducted three online fundraisers: **"Heroes Ukraine"** in support of combat medics, **"Birds of Freedom 2.0"** for the purchase of 10 inch FPV drones to support UAV strike units, and **"Heroes Lightning"** for the procurement of airplane-type FPV drones to support Ukraine's Special Operations Forces.

These fundraisers were carried out together with our partners, including the Come Back Alive Foundation, Saint Javelin, The Company Group, and Ostanniy Kapitalist.

UNITE WITH UKRAINE: KEY HIGHLIGHTS

Thirty MOVES SLC mobile life support systems, valued at \$5.98 million CAD (\$4.3 million USD / ₴177 million UAH), were delivered in partnership with the Maple Hope Foundation. Training provided by Thornhill Medical, Maple Hope Foundation, and the Ukrainian World Congress ensured full operational use by Ukrainian medics across elite military and security units.




Two hundred Blyskavka fixed-wing FPV drones, valued at approximately \$475,000 CAD (\$345,000 USD / ₴14 million UAH), were delivered to one of Ukraine's Special Operations Forces units in partnership with Ostanniy Capitalist, Saint Javelin, and Company Group, expanding the country's aerial reconnaissance and precision-strike capabilities.



Eighty SAROS 3000 mobile oxygen concentrator systems were delivered to the Azov Corps and Khartia Corps of Ukraine's National Guard in partnership with the Come Back Alive Foundation, Saint Javelin, and Adore Creative, providing essential medical support for wounded personnel.



The Ukrainian World Congress, together with the Canada-Ukraine Foundation and Canadian charity Help Us Help, in partnership with NGO Veteran Hub in Kyiv, launched a new veteran support project. The aim of this initiative is to expand and improve support services for Ukrainian veterans and their families, facilitate their reintegration into civilian life, and enhance their well-being through accessible, high-quality, and individualized assistance.



The project includes three key components:

Support Line, which continues to provide assistance to service members, veterans, and their families;

Text Counseling Service, which involves researching veterans' needs, developing, and implementing a methodology for remote support;

CRM System, which ensures a higher level of data security and efficiency in the Veteran Hub network.

STRENGTHENING UKRAINE'S DEFENSE: THE STRATEGIC IMPACT OF THE UKRAINIAN WORLD CONGRESS' UNITE WITH UKRAINE INITIATIVE

Over the past twelve months, Unite with Ukraine became a critical strategic enabler of Ukraine's national defense and resilience. Operating under the Ukrainian World Congress, the initiative connected the global Ukrainian diaspora and

international allies in direct support of Ukraine's defenders. It focused on systemic, needs-based interventions that complemented and reinforced Ukraine's national defense priorities. Donor contributions were efficiently translated into measurable frontline

impact, maximizing the strategic value of every initiative.

The initiative delivered advanced medical support, tactical equipment, vehicles, and specialized training programs to address critical capability gaps. Procurement and delivery systems were streamlined to ensure rapid and secure delivery of aid to front-line units. Transparent reporting and oversight built confidence among international partners and donors, reinforcing trust and accountability.

Unite with Ukraine strengthened the operational capacity and survivability of Ukraine's defenders across multiple structures, brigades and units. It provided tactical mobility assets, advanced medical systems, and protective equipment essential to sustaining combat effectiveness. Each program demonstrated measurable impact, directly improving battlefield performance and saving lives.

The initiative worked closely with the highest levels of Ukraine's military and government leadership, including the Ministry of Defence, the Main Directorate of Defense Intelligence, Ukraine's State Security Service, National Guard, Ministry of Internal Affairs, and the General Staff of the Armed Forces of Ukraine. All major projects were aligned with national defense planning and operational priorities, ensuring strategic coherence.

Unite with Ukraine served as a model of civil-military collaboration, integrating international support into official defense structures. Close coordination avoided duplication of effort and ensured that every project delivered maximum operational and strategic benefit. Unite with Ukraine prioritized long-term institutional capacity building within Ukraine's defense ecosystem.

Partnerships supported local production and maintenance of defense and medical systems, advancing Ukraine's growing military-industrial base. It laid the groundwork for sustainable logistics and support infrastructure, ensuring continued effectiveness beyond immediate needs.

MULTIPLE CITIZENSHIP

Adoption of the law on multiple citizenship: deepening Ukraine’s global connections for sustainable recovery.

Millions of Ukrainians abroad can now legally belong to the homeland they never left in spirit and participate in its rebuild.

Adopted in July 2025, the Law on Multiple Citizenship is a transformational reform. UWC initiated policy dialogue, drafted amendments and united cross-party support.

The adoption and signing of the Law on Multiple Citizenship is a historic moment for Ukraine and its global diaspora. The Ukrainian World Congress (UWC) played a fundamental role in this legislative process, ensuring that the voice of Ukrainians worldwide was heard and reflected.

- The Law on Multiple Citizenship opens new opportunities while safeguarding national security, bringing with it several key benefits:
- Preservation of the Ukrainian passport for millions of forced migrants.
- Greater opportunities to engage the diaspora in life and work in and for Ukraine.
- Stronger protections: safeguards for citizens of unfriendly states and thorough vetting of new citizens.
- Preservation of identity: mandatory exams in Ukrainian language, history, and the Constitution for new citizens.
- A decision for generations: guaranteed citizenship for descendants of Ukrainian nationals.

UWC CONTRIBUTION

1. Initiated and advocated for key safeguards in the law to protect Ukraine’s sovereignty and strengthen ties with the diaspora.
2. Initiated the creation of a special working group with Ukrainian legislators.
3. Provided expert analysis, advocacy, and diaspora engagement throughout the legislative process.
4. Drafted two additional bills proposing amendments to about 20 existing laws to harmonize them with the new legislation.

September 12, 2024 – In Kyiv, UWC President Paul Grod held a public discussion “Multiple Citizenship: Opportunities and Risks” with Ukrainian parliamentarians, stressing that multiple citizenship is both a tool to engage millions of Ukrainians abroad and a matter of national security. He emphasized the global Ukrainian community’s key requirements: equality of all Ukrainian citizens before the law, mandatory exams in language and history for new citizens, and security safeguards.

December 17, 2024 – First reading of the draft Law on Multiple Citizenship in the Verkhovna Rada. UWC submitted recommended amendments to ensure the law fully reflects Ukraine’s and its citizens’ interests. These included equality before the law, a list of recognized countries excluding those posing security threats, and stricter requirements for acquiring citizenship.

December 30, 2025 – A package of amendments to the draft law on multiple citizenship, proposed by UWC and supported by nearly 30 MPs from four factions, was registered in the Verkhovna Rada.

May 1, 2025 – UWC President Paul Grod raised the issue of adopting the Law on Multiple Citizenship during a meeting with leaders of the Verkhovna Rada’s interparliamentary groups.

June 12, 2025 – The UWC President addressed Ukrainian lawmakers at the Parliamentary Forum-Dialogue, calling for support of the multiple citizenship law.

June 16, 2025 – UWC issued a public statement urging adoption of Draft Law No. 11469, which sets the framework for multiple citizenship.

June 18, 2025 – The Verkhovna Rada adopted the Law on Multiple Citizenship.

July 16, 2025 – President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelenskyy signed Law No. 11469 on Multiple Citizenship. UWC congratulated the Ukrainian people on this historic step.

August 26, 2025 – President Zelenskyy announced at a meeting with the UWC delegation in Kyiv, the first countries under which the law would be applied: Germany, Poland, Czechia, Romania, followed by Canada and the United States.

ENERGIZE UKRAINE: SUPPORTING UKRAINE'S REBUILD

Russia's deliberate attacks on Ukraine's energy infrastructure are designed to break the spirit of our people - forcing them to flee or surrender. Through the Energize Ukraine initiative, we have united global energy leaders - manufacturers, utilities, power producers, and associations - to restore and protect Ukraine's energy systems. Keeping the lights on is not just about power; it's about resilience, survival, and ensuring Ukraine prevails.

ENERGIZE UKRAINE: STRENGTHENING ENERGY RESILIENCE AMID CRISIS

Russia's full-scale invasion has devastated Ukraine's energy infrastructure, disabling around 50% of its critical network and threatening electricity access for thousands of schools, hospitals, and essential services. In response, the Ukrainian World Congress, in partnership with Ukraine's Ministry of Energy and international donors, launched Energize Ukraine, a global initiative focused on rapid restoration, protection of frontline facilities, and community resilience.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2025

Grid Restoration: Over \$7 million CDN in equipment and services were delivered, including seven off-road vehicles and critical repair materials. These efforts stabilized electricity for more than 400,000 residents across three oblasts, helping prevent widespread blackouts during winter attacks.



Solar Schools Program: Four schools, including Irpin and Nemishaieve, received hybrid solar stations with battery storage, ensuring 2,900 students access uninterrupted education during outages. These systems save up to €16,800 EUR annually and cut emissions by 1,600 tons over 25 years. 179 students completed green energy courses.

Hospital Power Security: Ten frontline hospitals were equipped with autonomous solar mini-grids (50–100 kW), providing 4–6 hours of backup power, saving \$20,000 USD per hospital annually, and reducing CO₂ emissions by over 70 tons each.

Community Lighting: LED streetlight upgrades in 5–6 towns improved safety for 12,000 residents, cut energy use by up to 80%, and lowered municipal costs.

IMPACT AND PARTNERSHIPS

Energize Ukraine's rapid interventions restored power to over 500,000 consumers and reduced outage durations. Key partners include the Ministry of Energy of Ukraine, UkrEnerho, Alectra Utilities, Ontario Power Generation, Government of Alberta, Northland Power, Hydro Quebec, SaskPower, Clarion Events, among others.

Looking Ahead: 2026–2027

Plans include expanding microgrids to 100+ schools and hospitals, scaling solar installations, modernizing rebuilt schools, and continuing LED conversions to enhance safety and efficiency in liberated communities.


OVERVIEW:

Following the onset of war-related displacement in February 2022, Ukrainian communities in the United States and Mexico experienced rapid growth. Refugee support centers—ranging from volunteer-run initiatives to professionally staffed facilities like Chicago’s Selfreliance Center, supported by federal and state grants—were established. Across both countries, new organizations, churches, and fundraising efforts emerged to meet expanding humanitarian and advocacy needs.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

North America played a central role in high-level engagement and advocacy. First Lady Olena Zelenska visited Washington and New York to launch a university consortium focused on Ukraine, while President Zelenskyy and the First Lady met with U.S. leaders and participated in the UN General Assembly, supported by Ukrainian community leaders. Olena Zelenska also brought global attention to the issue of abducted Ukrainian children. Advocacy efforts included mass rallies in major cities, coordinated Advocacy Days on Capitol Hill by UCCA, Razom, NOVA, and others, and national letter-writing campaigns to Congress. Educational initiatives featured ZNO testing for displaced students in Chicago, organized by KonektMe and Refugee One, and the launch of a Ukrainian Saturday school in Mexico City. Humanitarian aid efforts led by Revived Soldiers Ukraine and Protez Foundation provided surgeries and prosthetics for wounded veterans, with U.S. doctors volunteering their time. Cultural diplomacy remained strong, with festivals, performances, and cross-cultural events in Mexico such as fashion shows and the formation of a Ukrainian chorus.


OVERVIEW:

Momentum across Latin America intensified in 2025, with new Ukrainian community structures gaining legal recognition in Peru, Colombia, and Ecuador. Ukrainian groups in nine countries advanced cultural diplomacy, humanitarian aid, advocacy, and community development, while countering assimilation trends. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Ukraine strengthened engagement and expanded the country’s diplomatic footprint across the region. The arrival of over 136,000 Russians in Argentina further underscored the strategic importance of promoting Ukraine’s narrative and national interests throughout Latin America.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2024/2025):

Ukrainian organizations across the region worked diligently to ensure that traditional celebrations such as First Bell, Easter Lunch, Heroes’ Day, Independence Day, Ivana Kupala Festival, Mother’s Day and others serve as vital opportunities to unite Ukrainians in communities where the common bond often connects third- and fourth-generation descendants. Education and Ukrainian studies remain top priorities, with programs led either by the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church (UGCC) or community organizations, primarily on a volunteer basis. Notable initiatives included participation in the Buenos Aires Book Fair with a Ukrainian stand, book launches and author meetings; a Pysanka Workshop for ambassadors and spouses of diplomats accredited in Argentina organized jointly with the spouse of Ukraine’s Ambassador Yuriy Klymenko; and the “Together for Ukraine” Festival featuring Italian, Spanish, Paraguayan and Argentine folklore ensembles, attended by the Mayor of Buenos Aires, the Ambassador of Ukraine and community leaders. Numerous dance performances and concerts—among the most popular expressions of Ukrainian culture — took place, with over 15 dance groups active in Argentina and similar numbers in Brazil. Archival and research work continued at the Prometheus Library and Documentary Center, along with photo exhibitions on the Holodomor, national costumes, folk art and painting. Regular meetings, conferences and receptions were held with politicians, artists, delegations from Ukraine’s Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and NGOs from Ukraine and the diaspora. Online meetings connected community leaders from Colombia, Peru, Ecuador, Panama, Paraguay and northern Argentina, while a delegation visit to Brazil took place on the occasion of the Congress of the Ukrainian Brazilian

Cooperation also included the city governments of Buenos Aires, Avellaneda, Berazategui, Berisso, and San Isidro, the provincial authorities of Misiones, the municipal governments of the Misiones and Chaco regions, and the city government of Buenos Aires.

ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS:

The Ukrainian Square in Curitiba, Brazil was officially reopened after major reconstruction, with the community appealing to national leaders to uphold international law and agreements.

GOALS FOR 2026:

- Increase awareness of Ukraine’s national priorities and interests.
- Strengthen engagement with smaller communities across the region by continuing to integrate “new” communities as UWC partners (Chile, Ecuador, Panama, Costa Rica).
- Continue developing Ukrainian educational initiatives and further enhance the professionalism of the schooling system.


OVERVIEW:

This year marked continued growth and consolidation of Ukrainian communities across Asia-Pacific and Eurasia. Japan saw steady expansion of UWC-affiliated organizations, Turkey welcomed new groups into the network, and China deepened its collaboration with the Ukrainian Embassy to connect more diaspora members. Advocacy, cultural diplomacy, and community-building remained central to regional activities.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

The UWC President visited Australia and New Zealand, engaging in media interviews, meeting with political leaders and Cardinal Mykola Bychok, and connecting with Ukrainian communities in multiple cities. Eleven regional meetings were held throughout the year, including sessions with leaders in Turkey, Japan, China, and the Philippines. Communities across the region marked the third anniversary of the full-scale invasion with coordinated events. Olga Herasymiuk, Head of the Television and Radio Committee, delivered seven lectures in Australia on countering disinformation. In Wellington, commemorations for UNR soldier Mykola Kharytonenko were held in partnership with UWC Ukraine, local authorities, and religious institutions, alongside advocacy training led by OUNZ Co-Chair Kateryna Turska. Online conferences and literary events supported cultural and historical engagement across the region.


OVERVIEW:

In 2025, Ukrainian communities across the Middle East and Central Asia demonstrated steadfast commitment to our national mission. The most active were those in the UAE, Kazakhstan, Azerbaijan, and Armenia; community engagement grew in Jordan, Kyrgyzstan, and Uzbekistan, while new formations emerged in Qatar and Saudi Arabia. Despite local challenges, these communities organized themselves, launched cultural and educational initiatives, supported humanitarian and defense projects, and strengthened Ukraine’s voice abroad.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

The region actively participated in the UWC’s global campaigns “Stand With Ukraine” marking the anniversary of February 24 and Ukraine’s Independence Day. In the United Arab Emirates, communities took an active part in the “Energize Ukraine” initiative. An additional advocacy tool was the launch of the children’s art exhibition “Colors of Hope,” featuring drawings by the children of Ukrainian prisoners of war. Advocacy materials were published in major media outlets such as The National (UAE) and Al Arabiya (Saudi Arabia), while in Kazakhstan a weekly Ukrainian-language radio program aired on Dostyk FM. The region’s primary focus remained cultural diplomacy. Meetings were held between the UWC Regional Vice President and representatives of the UAE royal family, Kazakhstan’s Minister of Culture and Information, and international leaders, including the Prime Minister of Finland and the Deputy Director-General of UNESCO.

OVERVIEW:


Expansion of the UWC network in Africa gained traction in 2025. The Ukrainian Association of Mauritius joined as an associate member, and the community in Tunisia formally registered as a civil society organization. Support continues for registration efforts in Botswana and Egypt, while initial engagement has begun with Ukrainians in Mauritania. Across the continent, communities are increasingly active in cultural diplomacy, advocacy, and education.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

The main focus of advocacy efforts across the continent has been the return of Ukrainian children forcibly deported by Russia. Cooperation has been established between Ukrainian and South African experts to advance advocacy on nuclear safety and the de-occupation of the Zaporizhzhia Nuclear Power Plant, to support UN reform, and to promote accountability for human rights violations and war crimes. As a result of this cooperation, a UWC representative will participate in the African Security Forum – the Tana Forum – in Ethiopia. Communities across the continent also support the psychological rehabilitation of children in Ukraine through cooperation with the “Voices of Children” organization. The Ukrainian Association of South Africa, in partnership with the Embassy of Ukraine, translated the audio guide at the Apartheid Museum, which was inaugurated during the first official visit of the President of Ukraine and the First Lady to the African continent on April 24, 2025. In Mazepa Bay, South Africa, an information plaque dedicated to Hetman Ivan Mazepa was unveiled, and in cooperation with the Holodomor Museum, an exhibition was created based on the letters of a Holodomor witness – South African engineer Jerry Berman.

Ukrainian Saturday schools remain active in Tunisia, Egypt, and South Africa, and in 2025 a new Ukrainian school was opened in Mauritius. Cooperation has also begun with newly established diplomatic missions. Events promoting cultural diplomacy and advocacy were held in Nigeria, Botswana, Zimbabwe, Zambia, Namibia, Kenya, Tunisia, and Mauritania.


OVERVIEW:

As of September 2025, while no new organizations formally joined the UWC network in Northern Europe, support for UWC initiatives grew notably in Sweden and Iceland. Ukrainian communities throughout the region remained engaged in humanitarian work, cultural programming, and advocacy, with increasing collaboration among civil society partners.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

The region saw the establishment of the UWC Humanitarian Committee and active participation in the Nordic Ukraine Advocacy Summit 2025. A strategic session was held for the Association of Ukrainians in Denmark, and communication was initiated with the newly appointed Norwegian Ambassador to strengthen ties with the Ukrainian community in Norway. Ongoing contact was established with the Ukrainian community in Iceland, with a follow-up meeting planned in Reykjavik. Community-building activities included regular meetings with civil society organizations and participation in major advocacy events such as the Copenhagen Democracy Summit and Folkemødet 2025. Regional meetings were held approximately every two months, fostering coordination and experience-sharing among representatives.


OVERVIEW:

Engagement surged in Western Europe during 2025, particularly in France, Germany, and Belgium. In France, UWC connected with 174 Ukrainian organizations—most of them newly formed. In Germany, ties were established with 30 active communities, and in Belgium, collaboration began with over 15 organizations. Initial steps were also taken to build partnerships in the United Kingdom, reflecting growing momentum and deeper integration of diaspora communities into the UWC network.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

A joint visit to Germany by UWC President Paul Grod helped unify local organizations, shifting from isolated efforts to active collaboration. UWC’s visibility in France increased significantly, with regular mentions in major Ukrainian media outlets, especially around European military support for Ukraine. Large-scale campaigns such as Ukrainian Independence Day, Vyshyvanka Day, and the anniversary of Russia’s full-scale invasion were held across the region, fostering unity and amplifying advocacy. Over ten major events took place, reinforcing inter-organizational ties and elevating the diaspora’s voice. Monthly online regional conferences supported coordination, cultural programming, and counter-disinformation efforts.


OVERVIEW:

Although no new communities formally joined the UWC network in South-Eastern Europe in 2025, efforts focused on strengthening cooperation with existing organizations. The region remained active in cultural diplomacy, advocacy, and community-building, with Serbia and Croatia showing the highest levels of engagement.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

The European Forum of the Ukrainian Diaspora in Novi Sad (December 2024) served as the central coordination platform, gathering over 630 participants from 50+ countries. Its outcomes guided regional priorities throughout 2025. Cultural diplomacy was advanced through festivals such as “Kalyna” in Serbia, the central Ukrainian celebration in Croatia, and “Ukrainiada” in Montenegro, fostering cross-border collaboration and visibility. Community-building activities included educational programs, religious celebrations, and advocacy campaigns that engaged families and youth. Advocacy efforts were undertaken across several countries, with Croatia leading the way through meetings with parliamentarians, government ministers, and civil society leaders. These engagements resulted in official statements and significantly heightened public and political awareness of Ukraine’s key issues.


OVERVIEW:

Southern Europe saw notable developments in 2025, with ten new Ukrainian organizations in Italy and Spain joining the UWC network. These additions reflect growing engagement from communities formed after the full-scale invasion. Ukrainian initiatives across the region focused on advocacy, humanitarian support, cultural diplomacy, and youth programming, with active participation in every country.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

Fundraising campaigns for the Armed Forces of Ukraine were held across all five countries. In Portugal, 17 children and 11 mothers from Sumy were hosted for rest and recovery, while summer camps for Ukrainian children were organized in Spain, Italy, and Portugal. Weekly rallies, media appearances, and political actions sustained advocacy momentum. Notable achievements included blocking a performance by Russian conductor Valery Gergiev in Italy, preventing Portuguese children from being sent to camps in occupied Crimea, reducing visibility of the Immortal Regiment, and stopping Russia's shadow fleet from entering Portuguese ports. Community unity was reinforced through large-scale events around February 24, Independence Day, Vyshyvanka Day, and Borscht Day.

ADVOCACY ACTIVITIES:

Efforts focused on two directions: supporting displaced Ukrainians through cooperation with officials, and promoting Ukraine's interests from grassroots to high-level political engagement. These actions were especially impactful ahead of major summits like the Ukraine Recovery Conference in Rome.

REGIONAL CONFERENCES:




OVERVIEW:

In 2025, UWC deepened cooperation with Ukrainian communities across 12 countries in Eastern Europe. Key efforts centered on strengthening civic partnerships, supporting Moldova’s EU integration, and preparing for the upcoming Forum of Ukrainians of Eastern Europe in Przemyśl, Poland. The region continues to serve as a strategic hub for advocacy, education, and counter-disinformation.

KEY PROJECTS & IMPACT (2025):

A landmark meeting in Georgia brought together UWC leadership, Ukrainian civic organizations, and state institutions to define strategic priorities and community needs. In Moldova, collaboration intensified around supporting the country’s EU accession process. Preparations began for the December 2025 Forum of Ukrainians of Eastern Europe, aimed at unifying communities, sharing best practices, and coordinating wartime support. Throughout the year, communities marked key historical dates such as Holodomor Memorial Day and Ukraine’s Independence Day with commemorative events across the region.

FOCUS AREAS (2025):



- Education Development – 20%

ADVOCACY ACTIVITIES:

The region actively participated in global campaigns like “Stand with Ukraine,” while also advancing Ukraine’s European and Euro-Atlantic integration. A high-level visit to Kyiv included meetings with the Vice Prime Minister for European and Euro-Atlantic Integration and the Foreign Minister, addressing security, refugee support, disinformation, and diaspora engagement. Monthly events and advocacy campaigns reinforced community unity and visibility.

GOALS FOR 2026:

- Increase in-person meetings to better assess and address community needs
- Identify and monitor organizations influenced by Russian interests
- Expand regional cooperation and advocacy capacity
- Strengthen diaspora unity and strategic alignment with Ukraine’s national priorities

KEEPING THE MEMORY ALIVE

FOCUS: COMMEMORATION OF THE HOLODOMOR – GENOCIDE

The Holodomor Descendants Network (HDN), in collaboration with the UWC Education Committee, expanded the “We Remember” program to global Ukrainian Studies Schools. Students in grades 8–11 will interview Holodomor descendants and record their stories, deepening their understanding of the genocide and preserving family histories. The program launches in Fall 2025.

In Chicago, HDN led the organizing committee for the annual Holodomor commemoration, co-sponsored by the Consulate General of Ukraine and UCCA Illinois. Held under the theme “We Remember the Holodomor. The Genocide Continues,” the event featured a requiem service, cultural performances, and a keynote address linking the Holodomor to today’s war in Ukraine, urging action and recognition.

FOCUS: TRANSGENERATIONAL EFFECTS OF THE HOLODOMOR

In partnership with Brent Bezo (Carleton University), HDN launched the first U.S.-based study on the long-term psychological and physiological effects of the Holodomor on Ukrainian American descendants. Outreach campaigns are underway to ensure robust participation.

Survey goals include:

- Identifying generational trauma patterns
- Comparing findings with prior research in Ukraine and Canada
- Raising awareness among descendants
- Demonstrating the enduring impact of Russian atrocities

HDN launched its inaugural newsletter, distributed to all registered descendants and interested parties. The publication highlights recent initiatives and outlines future plans to strengthen community engagement.

FOCUS: REGISTRATION DATABASE INTEGRITY

HDN successfully recovered all descendant registration data lost during the IT system transition. The database is now fully restored and up to date.



EDUCATION & LEADERSHIP



When a community comes together around education, it gives birth to the future. Ukrainian schools abroad stand as a living testament to our spirit – a remarkable achievement and a deep source of pride for the global Ukrainian diaspora.

Throughout 2025, the UWC International Educational Coordinating Council prioritized three core areas: advocating for diaspora schooling before government institutions (Ministry of Education, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and the former Ministry of Unity); expanding Ukrainian-language education, particularly in Central Asia and parts of Northern and Southeastern Europe; and strengthening UWC's global educational network by coordinating educational centers around shared initiatives.

A major success was the “Educational Marathon” held in April–May 2025, which brought together 987 educators from 63 countries across five continents. This platform fostered direct dialogue between Ukraine's Ministry of Education and diaspora schools, marking the first formal collaboration of its kind. As a result,

legislative proposals were initiated to support diaspora schools (recognition of learning outcomes), teachers (recognition of experience and access to free professional development), and students (adapted Ukrainian studies curriculum). UWC contributed 23 experienced educators from 22 countries to the Ministry's working group.

Over the year, the Council hosted 5 webinars on Ukrainian history to counter Russian disinformation, 11 professional development seminars for diaspora teachers, and participated in 21 international conferences, trainings, and educational dialogues. It completed the “Ukrainian School from A to Z” project and developed a Model Regulation for diaspora school operations. Together with the Lviv Regional State Administration and the International Institute of Education, Culture and Diaspora Relations (MIOK), the Council co-organized the Educational Academy in Lviv, which gathered 160 educators from 28 European countries.

The Council also led the first and second stages of the International Petro Jacyk Competition, developing tasks for four age categories. The school-level stage saw participation from 26 countries, while the national-level stage included 19. Additionally, the Council Chair conducted working visits to eight countries – Germany, Switzerland, the UK, Estonia, France, Czech Republic, and Austria – to engage directly with Ukrainian educational centers.

Key partners included Ukraine's Ministry of Education and its departments, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Office of the President, the International Institute of Education, Culture and Diaspora Relations (MIOK), the Ukrainian World Federation of Youth Organizations, the National Academy of Sciences of Ukraine, the L. Vynar Institute for Diaspora Studies, and the Kyiv-Mohyla Business School. As of 2025, the Council comprises 15 members from 10 countries across four continents.

YOUTH LEADERSHIP FOUNDATION

The Ukrainian World Congress launched the Youth Leadership Foundation in Memory of Stefan Romaniw on March 19, 2025. The announcement was made by UWC President Paul Grod during a gala dinner held in Melbourne, Australia, as part of the Australian Federation of Ukrainian Organizations (AFUO) Zyizd and Triennial General Meeting.

FOCUS: EMPOWERING THE NEXT GENERATION OF UKRAINIAN LEADERS

- Identified and supported emerging leaders in the diaspora through initiatives such as UWC '30 under 30'
- Provided educational and internship programs to strengthen leadership skills, community engagement, and knowledge of Ukraine and its culture
- Built a global network of young Ukrainians to share experiences and implement joint projects supporting Ukraine's defense and reconstruction

The Foundation is working with multiple partners including, the Ukrainian Catholic University and the International Institute of Education, Culture and Diaspora Relations (IIEC/MIOK) to offer leadership development and educational programming.

KEY ACHIEVEMENT:



The platform enables participation in leadership programs and mentorship opportunities, enhancing global engagement and paving the way for the 2026 '30 under 30' award spotlighting future leaders of Ukraine.

In 2025, as the war entered its third year, UWC continued to demonstrate resilience and unwavering commitment to Ukraine’s freedom. We secured \$3.7 million in revenue, a powerful testament to the enduring trust and loyalty of our global donor community. While fundraising naturally stabilized after two years of extraordinary mobilization, contributions remained strong and steady, with 78% (\$2.86M) coming from the Unite with Ukraine program.




INCOME STRUCTURE

Income in 2025: \$3,693,632


EXPENSES STRUCTURE

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
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
